The special exhibition *Excavating Egypt: Great Discoveries from the Petrie Museum of Egyptian Archaeology, University College, London* provides a comprehensive look at the discoveries of British pioneer, Sir William Flinders Petrie (1853-1942). Over 220 of the Petrie Museum's most important objects are featured, including one of the world's earliest surviving dresses (circa 2400 BCE), royal art from the palace-city of the Akhenaten and his wife Nefertiti, a gold mummy mask, stone sculpture, and objects of daily life ranging from copper tweezers to a ceramic rat trap. You'll also be treated to *Heads and Tales: Portraits and Propaganda on Classical Coins*. Celebrating the recent acquisition of more than 900 ancient coins from two collectors, this exhibition is complemented by information derived from primary research conducted by students in Professor Bettina Bergmann's Art 310 seminar.
